Color Theory Hacks

1. Use the 603010 Rule : Divide your color scheme into 60% primary color, 30% secondary color, and 10% accent color. This creates balance.

App: Use [Coolors](https://coolors.co) to generate and visualize color schemes easily.

2. Employ Analogous Colors : Choose colors next to each other on the color wheel for a harmonious look.

App: Use [Adobe Color](https://color.adobe.com) to find analogous color schemes.

3. Leverage Complementary Colors : Use colors opposite each other on the color wheel for vibrant contrasts.

App : Try [Canva's Color Wheel](https://www.canva.com/colors/colorwheel/) to find complementary colors.

4. Apply the Monochromatic Scheme : Use different shades of a single color for a cohesive look.

App: Use [Paletton](http://paletton.com) to create monochromatic palettes easily.

5. Use Color Temperature: Mix warm (reds, oranges) and cool (blues, greens) colors to balance your design.

App : Use [Coolors](https://coolors.co) to experiment with warm and cool color combinations.

6. Create Depth with Color : Use lighter shades for elements that should appear closer and darker shades for those that should recede.

App : Use [Adobe Illustrator](https://www.adobe.com/products/illustrator.html) to adjust shades and create depth.

7. Utilize Color Harmonies : Explore different color harmonies like triadic (three evenly spaced colors) or split complementary.

App: Use [Adobe Color](https://color.adobe.com) to explore various color harmonies.

8. Apply the Rule of 3 : Limit your palette to three main colors to keep your design focused.

App: Use [Coolors](https://coolors.co) to create and refine a three color palette.

9. Use Color Psychology : Understand the emotional impact of colors (e.g., blue for trust, red for excitement).

App: Use [Color Hunt](https://colorhunt.co) to find palettes that evoke specific emotions.

10. Create Contrast with Light and Dark : Use light and dark shades to create contrast and highlight important elements.

App : Use [Canva](https://www.canva.com) to apply and adjust light and dark shades in your designs.

Fonts Hacks

1. Use Font Combinations from the Same Typeface Family

Example: Use Roboto Regular for body text and Roboto Bold for headings in a presentation. This keeps the design unified and visually appealing.

2. Experiment with Display Fonts for Impact

Example: Use the display font 'Lobster' for the main title of a flyer to grab attention and create a fun, eye catching effect.

3. Implement Monospaced Fonts for Technical Design

Example: Use 'Courier New' in a coding tutorial to make the code blocks stand out and easy to read.

4. Use Script Fonts Sparingly

Example: Use 'Pacifico' for the signature line in a wedding invitation. It adds a personal touch without overwhelming the rest of the text.

5. Test Different Font Pairings

Example: Combine 'Merriweather' for headings with 'Open Sans' for body text in a blog post to create a balanced and readable layout.

6. Leverage Web Safe Fonts for Online Projects

Example: Use 'Arial' or 'Georgia' for a website to ensure consistent appearance across different browsers and devices.

7. Opt for Variable Fonts

Example: Use 'Roboto Flex' on a responsive website to adjust font weight and width for different screen sizes seamlessly.

8. Adjust Font Size for Readability

Example: Use a 16px font size for body text on a website to ensure it's easy to read on screens.

9. Use OpenType Features

Example: Utilize ligatures and stylistic alternates in 'Adobe Garamond Pro' for a magazine layout to add elegance and uniqueness.

10. Choose Fonts with Good XHeight

Example: Use 'Verdana' for the main text in an ebook. Its large x height improves readability, especially on small screens.

Typography Hacks

1. Use Ligatures Wisely: Ligatures like "fi" and "fl" make text look smoother.

Example : In Adobe Illustrator, turn on ligatures in the Character panel to see how "office" changes.

2. Adjust Spacing: Tweak the space between letters (kerning) and groups of letters (tracking) for better readability.

Example: Use [Kern Type](https://type.method.ac) to practice kerning by adjusting the space between letters in "W A T E R."

3. High Contrast : Make sure your text color stands out against the background.

Example: Use [WebAIM's Contrast Checker] (https://webaim.org/resources/contrastchecker/) to check if yellow text on a black background meets accessibility standards.

4. Custom Fonts : Create your own fonts or modify existing ones.

Example : Use [FontStruct](https://fontstruct.com) to design a unique font for your brand.

5. Font Hierarchy: Use different font sizes and weights to guide readers.

Example: In a poster, use a large bold font for the title, like "Concert Tonight," and a smaller, lighter font for details, like "at 7 PM."

6. Text as Art : Incorporate text into your designs creatively.

Example: In [Canva](https://www.canva.com), create a design where the text "SALE" is integrated into a shopping bag graphic.

7. Font Pairing: Mix different fonts (like serif and sans serif) for a nice look.

Example: Use [FontPair](https://fontpair.co) to combine "Merriweather" (serif) for headings and "Open Sans" (sans serif) for body text.

8. Responsive Text: Make your text size adjust to different screen sizes.

Example: Use [FlowType](http://simplefocus.com/flowtype/) to set up a webpage where the font size of "Welcome to Our Site" changes based on the window size.

9. Grids for Alignment : Use grid systems to keep your text lined up and neat.

Example: Use [Gridlover](http://www.gridlover.net) to set up a grid system for a blog layout, ensuring all text elements align properly.

10. Minimal Effects: Use effects like shadows or gradients sparingly.

Example: Use [CSS Gradient](https://cssgradient.io) to add the best gradient to the heading "Summer Sale" on your webpage.
